#### 1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Asansol Girls' College practices planned mechanisms for effective curriculum delivery. (i) The college administration prepares a well-structured weekly routine for each semester of UG and PG classes. (ii) Distribution of syllabus and class allotment of teachers is discussed in departmental meetings held in every department at the beginning of each academic session. (iii) The departmental routines are approved by the Principal, who supervises the regularity of classes. (iii) At the beginning of the session, a specially designed stream (B. A, B.Sc., B. Com& M.A) specific orientation/ induction programme is held for the freshers, after which the academic calendar is distributed to the first-semester students. (iv) A detailed discussion of the syllabus, and total number of credit scores for the curriculum is discussed with first-semester students. (v) PG department of Political Science also arrange classes on regular basis by external subject experts, of surrounding

premier institutes like University of Calcutta, University of Burdwan, and Kazi Nazrul University for covering portions of their course curriculum. (vi) The college has a rich central library with open access system, and many departments maintain their rich departmental libraries too for the benefit of the students. (vii) Several Journals (Science, Arts and Commerce) are subscribed by our college. E-books and e-journals are accessible through N-LIST (eShodhSindhu) Consortium of INFLIBNET from the college and from remote places by teachers and students. (viii) Students also benefit from the video lectures by different faculty members of our college on youtube & social media platforms. Various teaching methods are applied to effectively implement the curriculum, such as: a. Chalk and Blackboard method. b. ICT-enabled teachinglearning method. c. various software. d. Scientific models and charts. e. class notes provided by Some teachers y . f. Group discussion among students. g. Proper and adequate instrumentation facility provided to the students for their practical classes. h. The departments conduct need-based survey programs, field work, and educational excursions. i. Project work, and dissertations are conducted towards the fulfilment of their degrees. j. Seminars and special talks by experts. k. Regular class test, Mid semester examinations, regular assessment in practical classes are part of academic practices of our college. 1. Remedial and tutorial classes are also conducted. m. Departments maintain records of the classes, assessments, project reports etc. n. Parent-teacher meeting on each semester is held by the respective departments. o. Feedbacks are collected and its proper implementations are done with utmost sincerity. p. During the Covid19 pandemic our college has revived the teaching learning process by introducing online platform, the uses of which was mandatory for the teachers to teach the students. q. The IQAC of the college took the initiative to train the teachers and students about the 'Google classroom'. r. The college administration took the several outreach programmes to minimalize the digital divide among the students, from different financial strata. #### Feedback Obtained

It's a regular custom of the college to collect feedback from the Students of each semester and their Parents. From the academic session 2019-20, Asansol Girls' College has introduced complete online feedback mechanism. Structured feedback is collected from stakeholders like students, parents,. Student's feedback is on a five point scale (0-4 through our own online web application. The students assessed the over-all quality of the teaching-learning process, evaluate the teaching quality of the teachers, utility of student-centric methods ,arrangements of the college for future employment and the overall infrastructure of the college including laboratory facilities. 2.3.2 - Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Student mentoring system is available in our College. At the beginning of each academic session each department in its departmental meeting frame a policy in this regard. It gives support to the students at different levels like academic, personal and psycho-social support, professional and career counseling and other services. Tutorial Remedial Classes are conducted on a regular basis to help the slow learners. In the Tutorial Remedial Classes, the teachers meet small groups of students to help them in resolving their curricular and other academic needs. In these classes, the students can discuss their academic and discipline related problems without any hesitation or peer pressure. The faculty personally mentors the students on matters related to higher studies, choosing an option for the future and/or any support or guidance for their different entrance tests. To reach a larger number of students, the Career Counseling Cell of the college organizes various events for guiding them for development of their future prospects. To mention, it organized a mock test in the college campus on 2nd February 2020 which was conducted by the Labour Department ,Govt of West Bengal to give them an idea of facing competitive examination thus boosting their confidence. Many Departments of the college organize industrial visit, institute visit, field visit etc for helping them enhance their practical knowledge and enlarging their scope for jobs. Similarly Extension Activities like NSS, NCC, Community Outreach Programs, Extra-Curricular Activities have faculty mentors who help the students in building organizational and leadership qualities and building peer rapport through advice, guidance and interaction within themselves. Not only the students their parents are made aware of the progress or deterioration of their child. Interaction with the parents through regular PTM help in all round development of the students which help them in having a brighter future.

The College has certain systems and procedure for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities. The maintenance of physical facilities of the college like departmental classroom, laboratory , Seminar Library, Computers, Projectors are done at the level of concerned Heads. For the small scale maintenance works they are entitled to use the Departmental Contingency fund. For the maintenance of the laboratories the college provides Laboratory Contingency fund to the Departments. The large scale maintenance work is done at the permission of Governing Body of the College with prior approval of the Finance Committee. The various support facilities like Sports, Cultural Activities, Students Welfare, Career Counseling and Guidance are maintained by various Committees formed by the College through Teachers' Council Meeting. The College provides adequate infrastructural facilities for Teaching, Learning in terms of Smart Room, Class Rooms, Laboratories, with internet connections. A few social science Departments are equipped with latest LCD projector. The college also has a well equipped Computer Centre which are used by the students for lab-based classes as well as faculty members for teaching-learning and Research work. The college has a Research Consultancy Committee which supports departmental research works with financial grants amounting to Rs. 100000 per academic year. The College Campus is fully Wi-Fi enabled in which students can access the internet from each and every corner of the campus. Moreover, the college has an automated Central Library using LMS software developed by BCA department of this college. It has also an e-learning centre. The college also provides Lift and Ramp facilities for Specially Abled students and staff. The college has two wings of Girls Hostel each boarding capacity of 80 students and the Hostels are fully occupied in each academic year. The Hostel is maintained by the Hostel Committee. two lady wardens are appointed on contractual basis to manage the day to day affairs of the Hostels. Gate keepers and Night Guards are appointed by the college authority on contractual basis for security purpose of the college and Girls Hostel. The institute has made a provision for Annual Maintenance Contract(AMC) for maintaining its Generator and Xerox machines. Part-Time Technician is appointed for maintaining the computers and equipment. Part-time plumber ensures adequate supply of water, functioning of bore-well, adequate facilities in wash-rooms, cleaning of water tank and Part-Time Electrician is also appointed for fixing electrical line and panel faults, maintenance of air-conditioning, audio-visual systems for events/performances and overall state of electrical equipment. The overall ambience and general Campus facilities in Asansol Girls' College is sufficient to meet the needs of students and staff. The Campus is full of greenery and well served with internal roads. The atmosphere of the campus is environment friendly. The College has received Rs 2,00,00,000 (Two crore) under RUSA2.0 Grant for College development Purpose. The First phase Amount of Rs 100,00,000(One crore) has already been utilised for Infrastructural facility, and purchase of Equipment, ICT , Books Purpose. The Second Phase work is awaited for further release of the fund by the RUSA2.0.

The Governing Body forms different committee like Finance committee, Purchase Committee, Building Committee, ICC, Anti Ragging Committee etc. These committees play a vital role in overall infrastructural development of the college. Sexual harassment of the female staff and girl students are strictly addressed by the ICC. Bursar continuously monitors the financial transactions of the college. He also helps the Accountant in preparing all kinds of Bills to be submitted to the Government for grants. Day to day monitoring of the functioning of the Cashier helps in preparing the income expenditure statement to be audited both by the internal and external Auditors. b. Strategy Type	Details

Curriculum Development	It is the prerogative of the Kazi Nazrul University to design the curriculum. However, some of the faculty members of the college in capacity of members of the Board of Studies, do play a vital role in curriculum development, outlining ways for its improvement as well as its restructuring depending on the needs of time, though the final call on this is taken up by the University through their respective Board of Studies.
Teaching and Learning	Asansol Girls' College feels that the teaching and learning can be far more effective if it goes beyond the conventional methods that mostly rely on chalk and talk. Hence instead of being a one-way process where only the teacher speaks from the podium, it involves various methods ranging from interactive sessions between the students and the teachers, group discussions among the students, interdisciplinary seminars, workshops and so on. Power point presentations and use of smart boards in some of the departments further seek to enhance the quality of teaching. Field surveys are undertaken by some of the departments as a part of the curriculum. Educational tours are also organized by different departments to make the whole learning experience all the more joyful and creating a lasting impression on the young minds. However, since the outbreak of the pandemic, from March 2020, there has been a sea-change in the Teaching Learning process. As both students and teachers were confined in their homes, the latter had to devise ways to keep the pace of learning going and at the same time make it interesting. This was challenging for both the teachers and the students as remote learning and teaching has its own set of difficulties, which however could be overcome by our dedicated teachers as well as their equally dedicated students. Online platforms like google meet, WebEx, Zoom were used effectively to make learning as interactive as it had been in the physical classrooms. Many departments applied the principle of flip classrooms online also, whereby the study materials and even the recorded lectures were uploaded on platforms

	open for discussions in the live online classes. This ensured greater participation of the students and increased interaction. In this way both synchronous and asynchronous learning went side by side, that enabled the students learn at their own pace.
Examination and Evaluation	Examinations and evaluations in this session had started to be carried out as per the CBCS regulations. Apart from the end semester examinations with external evaluation of answer scripts, there had been continuous internal assessments in the forms of class tests, viva voice, departmental seminars, group discussions and so forth. There was however a break in this pattern with the outbreak of the pandemic and all examinations from mid march 2020 were conducted online. For the remaining of the session , 2019-20, each department set its own question paper and even the end semester examination scripts were also evaluated by the concerned teachers of the respective department.
Research and Development	Most of the faculty members are actively engaged in research and development, some of the research findings of our staff have also been published in renowned journals, already elaborated in Criterion III. The Research and Consultancy Committee of the College under the aegis of the Vice-Principal, in its endeavour to make the students develop research acumen along with bolstering the research potential of the faculty members, encourages the different departments to take up small scale research projects. The financial support has been provided from the college fund.
Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation	The College Library tries its best to cater to the needs of the students. In keeping with the new trends of the CBCS system, books were procured to meet the requirements of the new syllabus and added to the existing collection of the library. Apart from books on various subjects, the library has a rich collection of periodicals and journals. The library also offers internet and wifi facilities to its readers and also ensures that the students and the faculty members can access electronic resources like e-journals and e-books through N-List.

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7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

Asansol Girls' College takes its eco-friendly campus very seriously. Every year the college takes several measures to maintain and ensure the eco-friendly environment of the campus. This year the measures are as follows: 1. Tree Plantation Program: Asansol is essentially a major industrial area of West Bengal. Maintaining green as well as spreading awareness about the importance of greenery are essential for the people of Asansol. Hence, as a part of

celebrating Beat Air Pollution, the theme for the World Environment Day 2019, multiple tree plantation program were held during this year. Such as: A) A Tree Plantation Program was organised by Science Propagation Committee, Asansol Girls' College on 18/07/2019. Teachers, non-teaching staffs, students of our college planted trees in the premises of the college. B) A Tree Plantation Programme organised by Science Propagation Committee and Department of Physics, Asansol Girls' College on 27/07/2019. Students of Physics Department planted trees in the premises of the Department. 2. Initiation of Indoor- plant plantation in corridor by Department of Zoology and Physics on18.7.2019 and 27.7.2019 respectively. 3. Asansol Girls' College has rich garden with many rare plants within its campus. The college strives for maintaining the garden regularly. Apart from regular plantation and maintenance this year the college took the initiatives towards documentation and conservation of the plants within the campus. 4. The college campus is rich in flora and fauna. It is a natural habitat for different species of birds and creatures which has created its own biodiversity within the campus. In order to protect this biodiversity, the college has banned unnecessary killing of birds and creatures within the campus. 5. In order to further boost the eco-friendly nature of the campus, the college has introduced urban farming and growing of organic vegetables with its campus. 6. The college has taken the initiatives to extend the college garden-'Banobitan', a social forestry project. 7. The college has decided to make the campus free of e-waste so that the campus can be eco-friendly. It has taken measure to store e-waste safely for proper disposal. 8. The college continues to follow its policies of banning use of plastic tea cups and smoke within its campus.

#### 7.2 - Best Practices

#### 7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

I. To help students who have financial difficulties: The Aim: The aim of the practice is to provide the financial support to those who have problem in paying tuition and other fees. This will help those students to continue their studies without any mental stress. Context and Practice: The college receives students from various backgrounds. There are several students who are meritorious but not capable of paying tuition and other fees due to their financial conditions. In order to help those students to complete their courses without any problem, the institution has initiated a scholarship scheme to distribute fund to the needy students as full semester tuition fees waiver of half semester tuition fees based on their financial status and also performance in the academic and related activities. Success: A large percentage of students come to study here from the remote corners of this district and often belong to the lowest income groups. Many are first generation learners and receive absolutely no support from their families. These young women would not be in a position to pursue higher education if it were not for the extensive support-financial and otherwise-offered by the College. Problems: This practice is hampered by a lack of sufficient funds. II. Making campus sustainable with ample greenery that supports an eco-friendly environment. Aim: To promote environmental awareness and sustainability, the college works hard to keep its campus clean and green. It is also one of the most popular college practices. The colleges policy is to undertake environmental awareness programs and activities on a regular basis. Context and Practice: Students and faculty are invited to join in the green projects listed below at our campus: • Making the campus plastic, smoke free and clean - Keeping in the mind the better environment and health of all, the college campus is being made clean, free from any sort of plastic and use of smoke in any manner. • Environmental Day Celebrations, Tree plantation, maintenance of garden are regularly conducted. • Seminar talk on environmental awareness, exhibition are conducted. • Conservation of bio-diversity in the college campus and establishment of

medicinal plant garden and maintain greenery within the college campus. Success: Plants have been documented, including endangered and rare plants like Asan (crocodile bark tree), terminalia tomentosa Phalsa (Indian sherbet berry), grewia asiatica various fruit bearing trees, including the mango, guava, jamun (black plum), jackfruit, and jamrul (malay rose apple) and numerous flowering trees, including Ashoka, Shimul, Jarul, and China rose. Crows, common mynahs, pigeons, nightingales, kites, sparrows, seven sisters, rufus treepies, orioles, green-bee-eaters, squirrels, bees, and ants are some of the animals that use these places as breeding grounds. On the college grounds, a medical plant garden has been established where neem, bisalya karani, and other therapeutic plants are nurtured. Problems: Plant growth is hampered by a lack of land with sufficient sunlight throughout the day. The college needs more skilled workers and resources to build and manage the medicinal plant garden on a vast scale.
