1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Asansol Girls' College, situated at Asansol in Paschim Bardhaman District of West Bengal and registered under 2(f) and 12 B of the UGC Act, is hereby submitting the Self Study Report for Assessment and Accreditation (by the NAAC) in the Third Cycle. This institution had its First Cycle of Assessment and Accreditation in 2007 and Second Cycle of Assessment and Accreditation in 2016.

Since its establishment in 1950 the college was affiliated to Calcutta University until it came under the aegis of Burdwan University (founded in 1959) from 1st July, 1960. Subsequently with the inception of Kazi Nazrul University, Asansol, our college came under its auspices and became affiliated to it since 23rd June, 2015.

"Amar Mukti Aloy Aloy" (Emancipation through Light) – keeping this motto in mind Asansol Girls' College started its journey in 1950 to meet the demand of a higher educational institution in this coalfield area which would exclusively cater to the need of the women. Since its inception the institution is relentlessly striving towards the goal of woman empowerment where women from all sectors including socially and economically underprivileged would have access to higher education thus enabling them to transform into intellectually vibrant, socially responsible and self reliant human beings.

As mentioned earlier, the college had its First Cycle of assessment and accreditation in 2007 when the NAAC Peer Teem favourably inspected the college and awarded **B**+ **grade**. The NAAC Peer Teem inspected the college for the Second Cycle of Accreditation in 2016 and awarded **A grade**. The college has studied valuable suggestions intensively given by the Peer Team and has extended its academic as well as other activities in various new directions to stimulate woman emancipation.

This endeavour of applying for the assessment and accreditation by the NAAC for the Third Cycle implies the humble intention of introspection and further improvement of our premier institution.

- A good number of **reputed faculties** and **staff** contributes to the **academic excellence** of the students.
- AGC offers various degree programs on Humanities, Social Sciences and Basic Sciences, thereby adhereing to the Multidisciplinary approach of NEP 2020.
- Numerous publications by the Faculty members in reputed national and international journals reflect their **recognition and capability.**
- AGC funds various Research Projects relevent to the society and environment.
- AGC organizes Seminar/Webinar, Workshops, Conferences on various burning issues.
- The number of students **qualifying NET/SET and similar other Competitive examinations** prove that the institution is fruitfully contributing to the cultivation of the seed of higher learning in the country.
- AGC offers various **Add on and Certificate courses** which enhances the scope for the students for achieving their goals.
- AGC conducts **Art and Craft, Tailoring and Embroidery certificate** courses to foster skill and entrepreneurship among the students.
- AGC conducts regular **YOGA** classes.
- AGC maintains two NSS Units and one NCC Unit.
- **Feedbacks** are collected on a regular basis from the students, boarders and parents, alumni and potential employers.
- AGC boasts of students holding **University rank** from various departments.
- AGC runs with the **noncommercial motive** where service rather than profit is the driving force.
- **Different clubs**, viz. Nature Club, Drama Club, Photography, Chess, Drawing, Singing and Dancing Club, promots and recognises talented students through various co-curricular activities and events.
- Science Propagation Cell promotes scientific knowledge and fabrics among all students.
- **College Environmental Committee** continuously keeps vigil on the environmental framework of the college as well as promotes awareness about environmental degradation in neighbouring areas.
- Women's Forum of AGC conducts various programs and always safeguard the interests of the students.

- "Ujjiban Pathsala" an academic platform where teachers share their views on any relevant topic with their colleagues.
- The **democratic approach of management** and **team spirit** and synergy of the college undoubtedly is its supreme strength.

Institutional Weakness

- The college has to follow **fixed curriculum** framed by the Kazi Nazrul University and is unable to implement flexibility in its curriculum.
- There is shortage of **sufficient number of ICT** enabled **smart classes**.
- **Shortage of Faculties** in various departments hampers working of the respective department to their full potential.
- As it is an undergraduate college with **limited scope of research**, the college is yet to augment through patents or consultancies.
- Departments have Limited infrastructural Faccility.
- Absence of LMS relatively slows down the administrative as well as teaching activities.
- Though the college currently organizes placement for its learners and promotes campus recruitment, but **more such drives** are required.
- College **Website** is not properly updated.
- Enrollment is dwindling, particularly after COVID 19.

Institutional Opportunity

- The college follows CBCS framework and now NEP 2020 in delivering curriculum. It helps in promoting **Multidisciplinary and flexible** approach. It enables us to promote Vibrant **Indian Knowledge System.**
- The college has succeeded in maintaining desirable numbers of teaching and working days by **Monitoring** of Attendance of teaching and staff.
- **College library** has created opportunity for the inquisitive and needy student to benefit from the institutions.
- Students enroll in higher studies and pass various competitive examination.
- AGC will introduce PG programs in various subjects. AGC already submitted proposal for introducing PG program in Sanskrit and awaited for approval from the authority.
- The extension activities carried out through the **NSS** and the **NCC** and the various awareness programmes with the active support of the **alumni** have created opportunities for the college to emerge as a functioning member of the society at large.
- NCC CADETS take part in the March Past event on the occassion of the Independence Day and of the Republic Day organized by the Paschim Bardhaman District Administration.
- The **creation of IQAC** as per NAAC recommendation has made available for the college huge scope for keeping close vigilance on its academic activities as well as for adopting action plan for improvement.
- The **awareness programmes**, the sensitization of the students to socially relevant issues like **energy crisis**, **ground water depletion**, **protection of biodiversity** have created opportunity for the students to acquire knowledge beyond their syllabus. Students actively take part in such activities.
- The college observes **Independence Day, Matrivasha Diwas, Basanta Utsav, National Science Day, World Environment Day etc.** holistically.

- Students take part in cultural activities in the opening ceremony of the District Book Fair.
- They also exhibit their products of Art & Craft and Tailoring & Embroidery in the Stall provided them on behalf of the District Book Fair Committee.
- **Students** participate in various Sports & Cultural activities organized by different bodies of the Government of West Bengal.

Institutional Challenge

- The college has to **adapt changes in education policy** adopted by the Central as well as the State Government.
- The college has faced severe **challenge in implementing NEP 2020** due to paucity of faculty, staff and infrastructure.
- The unusual **delay in filling up vacant non-teaching** posts severely affects its day to day administrative functioning.
- The college **has not successfully mobilized resources** from other sources like Private organization, NGOs etc.
- The class room teaching faced difficulties in accommodating students having passed out from various boards with different syllabus orientation and also with differences in language proficiency and also belong to various socio-cultural backgrounds.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Curricular Aspects form the foundation of the institutional framework of AGC. Being a college affiliated to the Kazi Nazrul University (KNU), the guidelines and mandated structure regarding the various courses offered –BA (Honours), BSc (Honours), BCom (Honours), BA(Programme), BSc(Program) and BCom(Program) are adhered to. Within the structured framework, AGC ensures that faculty members have **academic flexibility** for **effective teaching-learning emerging national and global trends**.

- 1. The Routine **Committee** (**RC**) along with Vice Principal, IQAC Coordinator and departmental Coordinators oversee **planning** and **implementation** of curricular aspects.
- 2. Faculty follow **blended mode (Offline &Online) of teaching using** conventional **'chalk and talk'** method as well as with modern **IT enabled tools**.
- 3. Faculty follow a well-structured **lesson plan** to complete the syllabus in time.
- 4. Crosscutting issues relevant to **Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability** are integrated in the Curriculum and also by organizing seminars/workshops on these issues.
- 5. Classroom discussions go beyond the syllabi, including aspects of **multi-skill development**, transforming students into **lifelong learners** and **innovators**. Curriculum delivery within the classroom incorporates a variety of learning experiences that result in **critical thinking**, **creativity** and **scientific temper**.
- 6. **Project works are mandatory** for Students of 1st semester in the curriculum of Ability Enhancement Course (AECC), Environmental Studies. Some departments arrange **internships for students**.
- 7. Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) of students is incorporated within the Academic Calendar (AC) following the prescribed KNU framework. Internal Assessment (IA) comprises tutorials,

practical discussions, periodic assessments, class-tests, student presentations, quizzes and assignments.

- 8. AGC organizes International/National/departmental seminars, webinars, workshops and conferences.
- 9. AGC offers Add-on and certificate courses and outreach programmes.
- 10. AGC boasts of one unit of NCC and two units of NSS where students can enrol and engage in extracurricular activities. These activities instil in students a sense of responsibility and humility.
- 11. AGC organizes annual **Sports**.
- 12. Some faculties being a member of **Board of Studies** of KNU engaged in curriculum development periodically.
- 13. AGC has collected **feedback from stakeholders**. Departments meet with parents for **periodic self-evaluation**. Concrete suggestions and the modalities are discussed with **IQAC** and the **Governing Body**.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- 1. Admission to Asansol Girls' College is as per **Government of West Bengal and Kazi Nazrul University (KNU) guidelines**. We adhere strictly to the reservation policy laid down by the Government of India and Government of West Bengal.
- 2. **Program Outcome (PO) and Course Outcome (CO)** are displayed in College website and are conveyed to the students by respective teachers.
- 3. A **well-structured routine** offers regular intensive classes. Apart from that, tutorial system, intensive lab work, continuous evaluation through IA, and a functioning mentor-mentee programme make our classrooms **inclusive**.
- 4. The College offers a variety of Add-on and Certificate courses.
- 5. **Remedial classes** are arranged for slow learners and **Tutorial classes** for advance learners.
- 6. The **Wi-Fi-enabled campus**, a moderate student-computer ratio and ICT assistance help students to bridge the digital gap.
- 7. Experiential, as well as participative learning, are optimized within the classroom and beyond. Students participate in **seminars/workshops, field surveys, educational tour, University and industry visits**. Departmental wall magazines/Annual college magazine, Poster Presentations, Model Presentations, Group Discussion are some student centric learning methodologies.
- 8. **Internships** outside the college are encouraged and facilitated. Undergraduate research is encouraged through **Research Consultancy Committee**. This research and experiential learning will certainly ease the transition to NEP 2020.
- 9. The **use of ICT tools** is integral to academic and administrative functioning. Classrooms and laboratories are equipped with projection facilities and Wi-Fi access. ICT capacities allowed a smooth transition to online teaching during the pandemic.
- 10. More than 90% of teaching posts are filled and this brings the student teacher ratio to 26.87.
- 11. More than 75% of teachers have PhD. degree providing quality teaching experience.
- 12. Student Grievance Redressal mechanisms, as recommended by UGC, are in place and fully functional.
- 13. More than 95% of students passed final examination during the last five years. This validates the success of the teaching-learning processes at AGC.
- 14. Students have progressed to higher education or got some employment opportunities.
- 15. Some students passed NET/GATE/JAM etc.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The vibrant environment of the college encourages both the faculty and the students to engage in active research, innovations and extension activities.

- 1. The **Research Consultancy Committee** plays a pivotal in not just bolstering research acumen of the students, but it promotes research activities among the faculty members as well. A number of teachers are pursuing their Ph.Ds. while many of them have already been awarded their doctoral degrees. Alongside, some teachers have applied for research grants from various funding agencies.
- 2. Many number of research papers have been published, of which 86 feature on the UGC- Care list. Besides 59 book chapters/ papers in conference proceedings have also been published.
- 3. The Seminar Committee of the college plays a key role in diffusion of knowledge, by organising seminars/webinars and also goes on to provide every possible support to departments keen on organising such programmes. In the period, 2018-2023, 63 seminars/webinars/worshops/lectures were organized on diverse topics. Raja Rammohun Roy Library Foundation sponsored one of its seminars. The College has also secured RUSA grants that helped in procuring various books, research and laboratory equipment.
- 4. Asansol Girls' College in order to instil in the students the real value of education makes them go beyond classroom learning to the greater community and develop a sense of responsibility towards all beings. Hence, the College in sync with the various government programmes like *Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan, Jan Shakti for Jal Shakti, Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao, Swacch Bharat Mission* and others had undertaken several such extension and outreach programmes in its humble endeavour to make a positive impact in the society. The different departments along with the Social Activity Committee, the NCC, the NSS, the Science Propagation Committee, the College Environmental Committee and the Women's Forum work throughout the year. During the period 2018-2023, 47 extension and outreach programmes were undertaken.
- 5. The institution has also received **9 recognitions for its service** from governmental and non-governmental bodies.
- 6. The college has **43 MOUs and linkage**s with various institutes to promote collaboration in academic and non-academic spheres that include faculty exchange programmes, career guidance, e-waste management among others.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

AGC has newfangled infrastructure which is intermittently maintained.

- 1. AGC spends **51.22 percent** of their total expenditure, excluding salary component, **on infrastructure development and augmentations** and **29.28 percent** of total expenditure, excluding salary component, on **maintenance of physical facilities and academic support**.
- 2. AGC is split up into three Blocks consisting of **five buildings Four** three storied and **one** two storied accommodating a total number of **38 classrooms**.
- 3. There are 20 departments out of which 12 laboratory-based departments are fully equipped with modern equipment and machineries, Laboratories, Seminar Library, Projectors, computer equipment with internet connections.
- 4. AGC has dedicated staff including the Electrician, Plumber, and support staff who work round the

clock to carry out instant repairs.

- 5. The campus is under 360-degree CCTV Surveillance by 25 CCTV cameras and Wi-Fi facility is accessible everywhere. The existing Internet Bandwidth is 100MBPS.
- 6. Six Smart Rooms, one ICT centre and Computer Centre with computers having internet facility, aid to ICT based learning to students in lab-based classes and assists the faculty members for teaching-learning and Research work.
- 7. AGC maintains a healthy students-computer ratio of near about 30.
- 8. The Central Library is automated using LMS software Koha version 23.11.00.
- 9. Outdoor games like badminton, volleyball etc. and Indoor games like badminton etc. are abet to the students.
- 10. AGC Ensures a holistic development of its pupils through Yoga classes by well-trained Yoga Teacher.
- 11. An **Air conditioned Auditorium** equipped with **modern sound system and projector** is used for conducting Cultural and Co-curricular activities and hosting Seminars/Workshops and NSS and NCC activities.
- 12. Salary of the college staff is administered online through the West Bengal Integrated Fund Management System portal. West Bengal Health Care Schemes are made available to the staff of the college. The college Finance is taken care by the College Administration Management System portal.
- 13. **Online admission** has been introduced since 2015 and is conducted efficiently and **Online submission of marks** is done through the university portal.
- 14. Online feedback is collected from stakeholders, and grievances are taken care of at the earliest.

Student Support and Progression

- 1. Students of AGC have **benefitted** from different government sponsored scholarships like **SVMCM**, **Aikyashree**, **OASIS** apart from **tuition fees concession** and also from **Student Aid Fund** given by the college authority. During COVID 19, college authority **waived tuition fees** of several students whose financial conditions were not supportive then.
- 2. For capacity development of students AGC offered courses in Soft skills, Language and Communication Skills, Life Skills and also ICT skills. Yoga is one such life skill course where they rejuvenate their mind and body.
- 3. AGC has **statutory committees** like Internal Complaint Committee, Anti Ragging Committee, Student Grievance Redressal Cell to look after complaints of students and **redress them in time**.
- 4. AGC has a good record of **student progression**. Many students got admission in PG courses and some of them have been placed successfully.
- 5. Students also **qualified** in NET/GATE/JAM etc. and also in competitive examinations.
- 6. Students received awards in State, National and University level Sports and cultural events.
- 7. AGC organizes Annual Sports and other cultural activities in regular manner. Students participated in cultural competition and best performers get opportunity to perform in Annual cultural event "Shristi Sokher Ullashey".
- 8. AGC has an active **registered Alumni Association**. They regularly meet and organize events like health check up camps, Sapling Plantation, awareness programs. They also help students financially for continuing their studies.

Governance, Leadership and Management

- 1. The vision and mission of the institution are guided by our college motto "*Amar Mukti Aloy Aloy*" which signifies **emancipation through light** or orienting students with the spirit of knowledge, liberation and enlightenment.
- 2. The institutional **academic and administrative structure** is governed by a highly dynamic, well-coordinated and strong leadership.
- 3. The Governing Body is the apex body of governance which provides guidance in all matters of the college. **The Principal, the faculty and administrative staff** collectively collaborate to implement the college's vision and mission in a transparent and student centric manner.
- 4. The **IQAC** plays a vibrant role in shaping the academic and administrative units of the institution. The IQAC, along with the principal, ensures that the formulated strategies and action plans are implemented effectively.
- 5. **Decentralisation and participative management** ensure that faculty, staff and students have a voice in shaping policies and practices that directly impact their academic and co-curricular experiences.
- 6. The administrative structure and functional unit of the college is well represented in the form of an **ORGANOGRAM**, depicting a clear hierarchy of roles and responsibilities within the organization.
- 7. Implementation of **e-governance** under different heads enhances overall effectiveness creating a more efficient and responsive administration for the institution.
- 8. The institution maintains academic standards through periodic preparation of **Teachers' Appraisal Forms** highlighting their individual performance. Promotions are given as per **CAS** rules and regulations based on the orders of the Directorate of Higher Education Department of West Bengal as well as the regulations laid down by the UGC.
- 9. College extends all **welfare measures** to the teaching and non –teaching staffs accordingly.
- 10. Financial support is provided to the faculty members for academic and professional development.
- 11. **Funds generated** from various sources under different heads such as RUSA 2.0, Student Aid Fund, installation of Lift, etc are optimally utilized according to the requirements of the college.
- 12. The college follows the financial rules, regulations and guidelines as per directives laid down by the **Finance Department and the Department of Higher Education of the Government of West Bengal** and undertakes **internal** and **external financial audits** regularly.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

- AGC has dedicated itself in upholding the concept of gender equity. AGC has an active Women's Forum for the promotion of gender equity. The Forum has also conducted Gender Audit for the year 2022-2023. NSS and NCC units also work to promoting gender equity. AGC has Internal Complaints Committee, to ensure a safe and secure woman friendly campus.
- 2. AGC has **policy documents on Green and Plastic Free Campus**. The college has conducted **Green Audit and Energy Audit**. The Institution has facilities and initiatives to actualise the concept of Green Campus.
- 3. AGC creates an inclusive environment where students across all intersections and socio-economic, linguistic backgrounds get opportunity to study.
- 4. AGC has a policy document for differently-abled students. It has differently-abled students friendly environment making education inclusive.
- 5. AGC instils constitutional values and obligations by organising seminars/workshops, observing days like Independence Day, Republic Day, etc. NSS, NCC, and other committees and departments conduct various programs like rally on Awareness to Exercise Voting Rights. AGC also celebrated Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsav and observed Bhagat Singh's Martyrdom Day, the 125th anniversary of the historic Chicago speech of Swami Vivekananda (2019).

- 6. AGC follows two Best Practices. a) AGC, with an aim of capacity building and empowerment of the student, introduced Earn While Learn as one of the best practices. For this two Certificate Courses a) Tailoring and Embroidery, and b) Art and Craft are offered to the students. AGC arranged an exhibition cum sale of their products in the college premises. For the last two years students have been exhibiting their handiworks at the Government sponsored Paschim Barddhaman Book Fair with much success. b) AGC has introduced Academic Innovation and Research Activity as its best practice to inculcate the spirit of research. Research Consultancy Committee approved research proposals submitted by the different departments. In these projects active involvement of students is compulsory. The Committee has achieved success as responses are spontaneous. Some of the projects have been completed. Some are yet to be submitted.
- 7. AGC has its legacy in **achieving distinctiveness** for overall development of the Women of the society.

Undergraduate programs are restructured with modified LOCF and internship. Open electives are offered in all undergraduate programs for the students of other departments with a view to impart quality 21st century skills to students. Multidisciplinary/ Interdisciplinary courses along with AEC, SECs and Value added courses under the NCCF structure is followed in the college from the session 2023-2024 and students are given the choice to opt for subjects across disciplines.. The Research Consultancy Committee of the college funds several research projects that are interdisciplinary in nature. Such admixtures of domain knowledge that draws upon humanities, social science, natural and applied science, information technology will largely help to achieve the positive outcome of a curriculum multidisciplinary and holistic in spirit and approach. The college offers discipline core courses on Microbiology, Nutrition, BCA which is a reflection of promoting multidisciplinary approach in teaching and learning process. The institution offers several flexible and innovative curricula in the areas of community engagement and service through NSS, environmental education, and value-based education. The college promotes multidisciplinary and flexible curriculum at different semesters of undergraduate education by encouraging students to take up diverse trainings in the field of Yoga, vocational courses like Art and Craft, Tailoring and Embroidery etc. Various interdisciplinary/ multidisciplinary add- on courses are run by several departments to develop academic acumen as well as necessary skills among the students. Soft skills like communication and personality development provide a cutting edge to the students to face group discussions and interviews in their future endeavors. Seminars and webinars are conducted by individual departments in collaboration with the IQAC on regular intervals covering wide array of topics cutting across disciplines. The Institution has a dedicated NSS team through which the students take up projects of outreach and community service to the aged and the underprivileged. Environmental awareness drive takes place in and outside the campus at a regular basis. The college aspires to emerge as a multidisciplinary higher education institution that prioritizes a student-centric approach towards education. A remarkable effort at regular knowledge

	sharing activity among various faculties and departments is perceived in the invited lectures and faculty exchange processes not only from outside but in in-campus endeavors.
2. The registration process has started from session 2023-2024 with the support of Kazi Nazrul University. Under Academic Bank of credit, student credits for a particular program from an institution may be transferred / redeemed by another institution upon that students' consent. The college has taken various measures like regularly counseling students, displaying on website etc. to motivate students to register in the ABC and open their accounts.
3. Skill development:	The National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 places significant emphasis on skill development as a core aspect of its comprehensive reforms. The policy envisions equipping students with practical skills and competencies that are essential for thriving in the modern world. By focusing on skill development, NEP 2020 aims to create a workforce that is well prepared to tackle the challenges of the 21st century and contribute effectively to the nation's development. Asansol Girls' College is committed to take up responsibility for the future of its students. Skill oriented hands-on training are provided to its students in Art and Craft, Tailoring and Embroidery to make them market-ready for generation of income in the long run. Without in any way compromising with academics, the college feels the necessity to develop skills among its students so that they can contribute to the workforce intrinsic for the country's economic development. Add-on courses on Soft Skills and Fundamentals of Computer are offered to students. The UG curriculum has included Skill Enhancement Course (SEC) and Ability Enhancement Course (AEC) in keeping with the guideline of NCCF provided by the UGC to realize the vision of NEP 2020 to create a skilled workforce. These courses cover a wide spectrum of disciplines and areas, ranging from technical skills to soft skills, nurturing holistic skills in students. 2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The institution adheres to the **Academic Calendar** for the conduct of **Continuous Internal Assessment** (**CIA**). The college strictly follows the academic calendar, developed in tune with the university calendar. The academic calendar is important for implementing the change in the evaluation system from the conventional annual/periodic pattern to the continuous internal evaluation. It provides the students with an overview of the number of working days, information about the internal assessments, conducted in a continuous manner in the semester system.

Continuous internal assessment may be of different form as per the discretion of the department. It may be

- Written Internal Tests
- Assignments,
- Class Tests,
- Surprise Tests,
- Unit Tests,
- Seminar Presentations,
- Surveys,
- Quizzes
- Project Presentations
- Viva

For conducting this, a notification of schedule is posted in the College Website. Students' performance in CIA are discussed with them and internal examination may be scheduled again for poor performers and also for absentees, if needed.

Remedial classes are also taken for the **slow learners**.

Examination system has two components: Continuous Internal Assessment and End Semester Examination or External Examination.

The college has regularly conducted this **External Examination** under the University guidelines. Students are guided in filling up the University Examination Forms, are informed about the schedule and their examination centers and also the information of publication of Results. AGC has an **Examination Committee** which takes the responsibility of conducting the University examination smoothly with the help of the non-teaching staff members of the College. It has framed an invigilation duty schedule for the teachers and also designed duty roster for Non-teaching staff for smooth functioning of the examination process.

Apart from that teachers are acted as **Member of the Board of Studies**, **Moderator**, **Paper Setter**, **Evaluator and Reviewer** of University External Examination.

The College has, as per UGC regulations, a strong grievance redressal mechanism monitored by **Grievance Redressal Cell** to accomplish its mission of quality teaching-learning and evaluation in an enabling environment.

- If any critical case appears then it immediately **communicated** to the competent authority of the **University for Necessary Action**.
- Any grievances related to **question papers or anomalies in admit cards, mark sheets** etc. are also informed to the **University immediately** as a measure of addressing grievances.
- In case of internal assessment, if there is any complaints against the internal assessment the **student can check their answer scripts**, and if require their parents are also communicated about the performances their daughter through **PTM** (**Parent Teacher Meeting**).
- **Mentor-mentee** process is also maintained throughout the year to reach out to their root problems. The departmental teachers always keep an eye on the inconvenience and difficulties faced by the students and provided solutions as needed.
- The college administration also provides all necessary support to their **students so that they can apply to the University to review their answer scripts** of the semester examination.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1

Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website

Response:

AGC has a **Vision** to promote and spread holistic education among Girls' from all sections of the society. To achieve this vision AGC offers a variety of Programs and Courses under CBCS and as per KNU guidelines. The outcomes of these Programs and Courses are prepared by the departments.

The **Programme Outcomes and the Course Outcomes** are uploaded on the **College Website** for the benefit of both students and faculty members so that planning and curriculum delivery becomes easier.

- At entry level students have to undergo an **Orientation Programme** wherein they are made aware of the learning outcomes of the various courses.
- Copies of the PO and CO are also shared with students in PDF format through WhatsApp groups for their awareness. POs and COs are formulated in order to give students a prior idea about what to expect from a particular course or programme. The nomenclature of courses offered under this programme Core courses, DSC, SEC, GE, and DSE reflect expected outcomes. Counseling sessions are arranged at the beginning of each semester to ensure that students make informed choices regarding optional papers DSE, GE and SEC following their long-term academic and career plans. The generic objective of a specific course is communicated to students by faculty at the beginning of each session. These are reiterated through discussions and small group tutorials.
- Through **hands-on training** in all laboratory courses, the importance of arriving at an outcome in consonance with the task set is emphasized. **Lab work and tutorials** provide immediate feedback to students.
- The faculty members of the institution actively participate in curricular revisions at the university level. This exercise helps teachers to visualize and articulate course outcomes and learning objectives in their respective disciplines. Since ours is not an Autonomous college, the responsibility of designing the curriculum and framing the syllabus for all the UG programs rests with the affiliating University, KNU. Some teachers of the college from different subjects/courses are members of the Board of Studies of the University. They provide need-based inputs and inclusions in their syllabus by giving their valuable suggestions and advice. There are a range of program options and courses for students to choose from when applying for various courses. These courses and programs are prepared in compliance with the local, national and global trends and needs in mind.
- **CBCS LOCF:** Since 2020-21, KNU has adopted the concept of **LOCF** paradigm. It contains very clearly articulated learning objectives and course outcomes.
- Faculty members are encouraged to participate in FDPs to gain further knowledge about specific course objectives and tune classroom teaching accordingly. Such information are officially notified and regularly updated in the college website for the awareness of students as well as teachers.

Response:

For evaluating the attainment of POs and COs, AGC applies the **BLOOM'S TAXONOMY** which focuses on knowledge or Cognitive approach.

AGC incorporates this method in following ways.

Remember: At the very first stage students are asked to read and try to remember what they have learned from the class teaching and also from their books. The departments take **class tests** comprising short answer type questions for checking their progress.

Understand: Here students are asked to comprehend the learning thoroughly so that they can explain it in their own language. Here students have to answer **MCQ** type question papers to see whether they comprehend the topics.

Apply: After understanding what they have learned they are asked to solve problems. **Problem solving** questions are asked in class tests and in internal examination. Also they are asked to submit **Assignments** on a particular topic.

Analyze: At this stage they are ready to analyze the concept. They have collected data in **educational tour** and analyze and make a report. Some departments arrange **internship** for their students.

Evaluate: AGC conducts **Internal examination** continuously through out the semester to evaluate the performance of the students. They are also evaluated by the **Final examination** conducted by the University.

Create: At the last stage student have complete idea about their topic so that they can make their project reports. Students from all the department are asked to submit their **project report** on Environmental studies as part of their curriculum.

In this way AGC tries to evaluate the attainment of POs and COs. However, it is true that the performance of all students are not satisfactory and for them the departments arrange **Remedial Classes**.

However, the above method evaluates the attainment of PO and CO subjectively. We can evaluate **objectively using Students' results and their progression report.**

- Students' Results: More than 90% of students appearing for final examination have qualified and some of them became University Topper.
- Students' Progression to higher education may be a yardstick to measure the extent to which programme outcomes have been achieved. A large number of students pursue higher academics. Students got opportunity in internships and got placements in different sectors. Many are qualified in NET/SET/GATE/JAM etc. These reflect the attainment of desired and

stated goals.

Response:

Asansol Girls' College always tries to trigger young minds to explore their infinite possibilities .

The college fosters the academic and research environment through the **Research Consultancy Committee, Science Propagation Committee, Seminar Committee, and Ujjibani Pathamala.**

1. **The Research Consultancy Committee** was formed in our institute on December 12, 2019, even before the National Educational Policy (NEP) 2020 proposed active promotion of research in universities and colleges. This was done to bring to the fore a multidisciplinary ecosystem, to instil in the students a spirit of inquiry and to make them participate in research guided by the teachers. The vibrant research environment of the college is not just conducive for developing

research acumen of the students; it facilitates research development of the faculty members as well. Apart from teaching, our teachers are actively involved in research activities.

- 2. **The Science Propagation Committee,** in its bid to foster a scientific temperament among the students, staff, and community as a whole, undertakes various novel initiatives throughout the year. This involves observing National Science Day, participating in district Science fairs, organising seminars, commemorating science personalities, and taking a conscious step towards protecting the environment by organising environmental awareness programmes and so on.
- 3. **The Seminar Committee** of the college plays a pivotal role in the diffusion of knowledge on a wide array of subjects, by organising seminars/webinars and also goes on to provide every possible support to departments keen on organising such programmes.
- 4. **Ujjibani Pathamala** is the teachers' study circle of the college, functioning since December 20, 2017, where regular academic discussions are held, facilitating interdisciplinary exchanges among the faculty members.
- The Institute takes a keen interest in promoting the **Indian Knowledge System**. Even before National Education Policy 2020 spelled out the importance of IKS in the shaping of modern day curricula, the institute functioning under Kazi Nazrul University had implemented it as reflected in the course designs of the various departments.
- Further, keeping in tune with the NEP 2020, which finally gives long awaited recognition to the ancient knowledge system of the land and considers it the prime guiding principle in shaping the educational sector, **IKS** has received a further boost in the new curricula.
- In consonance with the NEP 2020, which vociferously promotes the inclusion of diverse forms of knowledge based on IKS, the institute has decided to make **YOGA** an integral part of the students' lives.
- Not just YOGA as a subject features in an **MD** course, but to realise its complete essence, the institute has constituted the '**Yoga for Well-being Club**', which imparts free yoga lessons to interested students.
- The college had also conducted a series of classes on Value Education (Sadalap) to impart moral lessons.
- In its mission to create awareness about **IPR** the college has in total conducted one seminar and three webinars.

- AGC is segregated into three Blocks consisting of five buildings Four three storied and one two storied with a total number of 38 class rooms. Another two storied building "Bhasha Bhawan" of 450 sq. m. has recently been constructed by Zila Parishad from College Fund and awaits to be inaugurated after completion of furnishing. Total built up area being 3452.18 sq.m
- A two storied building is proposed to be built under the RUSA 2.0 Scheme.
- 12 laboratory-based departments which are fully equipped with modern equipment and machineries, Laboratories, Seminar Library, Projectors, computer equipment with internet connections. Most of the lab- based departments have desktops and printers.
- Some departments are equipped with **projectors and laptops** for modern teaching-learning process.
- There are **101 Computers in the college and 8 laptops** which are updated regularly.
- A **new advanced practical centre** of BIOCHEMISTRY for the department of Microbiology, Botany and Nutrition with modern facility.
- Spacious well equipped Common Rooms in the College and the Hostel offer recreational facilities with indoor games.
- Two blocks of **Hostel Buildings** accommodates 80 students in each block,named **Nibedita** and **Anjali** and **four Staff Quater** within the periphery of the College Campus,
- Anjali Hostel uses renewable energy from the Solar Panel installed in its rooftop.
- There is a total of **twenty-five washrooms in the College Campus** out of which seven are exclusively for female staff and six for male and **twelve washrooms are** for the students.
- Lift, Ramp and wash room facilities for specially-abled students and staff.
- The Eco-Generators provides uninterrupted power supply to the campus and hostel.
- A **Canteen** for students and staff, with separate seating arrangements for both.
- A **pump house** and **eleven water tanks**, six in college campus and five in hostel facilitates uninterrupted fresh water supply,.
- Three water coolers and purifiers at different corners of the college including the staff room provides clean and cool water during the scorching summers.
- Fire Extinguishers at every nook and corner of the college.

The college provides following ICT facilities

- The campus has CCTV Surveillance by 25 CCTV cameras and WiFi facility.
- Six Smart Rooms, one ICT centre with 25 computers with internet facility and a wellequipped Computer Centre with 41 computers which are used by the students for lab-based classes as well as by faculty members for teaching-learning and Research work.
- An automated Central Library using LMS software Koha version 23.11.00.

The College facilitates the following Cultural and sports activities,

- The Auditorium named 'Rabindra Kakhya' is fully Air conditioned and is equipped with modern sound system and projector. It is used for conducting Cultural and Co-curricular activities and hosting Seminars / Workshops and NSS and NCC activities.
- There is also an **Open Stage** where annual cultural program are held.
- Outdoor games like badminton, volleyball, discuss throwing, shot put, Javelin throw, high jump etc. and Indoor games like badminton etc.
- Ensures a holistic development of its pupils through **Yoga classes**, where **well-trained Yoga Teacher** take classes.

- In our quest for automation that began in 2006, we initially implemented our proprietary **Library Management System (LMS)**, marking the initial steps towards a more streamlined and efficient library experience. Recognizing the ever-evolving landscape of technological breakthroughs and the remarkable advancements in **Integrated Library Management Systems (ILMS)**, we recently made a strategic transition to **Koha version 23.11.00**. This cutting-edge ILMS now serves (**https://agc-opac.kohacloud.in**/) as a testament to our commitment to staying technologically updated, and providing our academic community with an intuitive and state-ofthe-art platform.
- This pivotal move aligns seamlessly with the broader vision of the **RUSA 2.0 project**, which places a distinct emphasis on library automation and retro-conversion (**Ref. No. AGC/RUSA 2.0/2022-2023/04**).
- The library is enriched with **35,144 volumes of books** in different languages. Since 2016, our library has embraced digital innovations by subscribing to e-books and e-journals via the **N-LIST** portal.
- E-access of library book database facilities is available through the Web-OPAC (https://agc-opac.kohacloud.in/cgi-bin/koha/opac-main.pl). The library provides e-references (https://libraryagc.blogspot.com/ through library blog library facebook) (https://www.facebook.com/library.agc/), email service (library.agc@gmail.com) (library@agc.ac.in), and messages to ensure seamless and accessible interactions with our academic community. The library users can access e-resources through the library portal (https://agc-opac.kohacloud.in/cgi-bin/koha/opac-main.pl) for a directory of open access journals, and actively support OER initiatives by providing resources from platforms such as egyankosh, NPTEL, and spoken tutorial; career-oriented magazines, newspapers, open theses, and dissertations.
- The library has provision of 11 computers with internet facility and free wi-fi to access the e-

resources. Besides, the library subscribes printed four journals, six magazines, four daily newspapers and career-oriented newspapers, and magazines.

- To promote a diverse range of library events, a significant number of webinars have been organized, along with a seminar held on 7th and 8th December 2022. This seminar was sponsored by RRRLF under the Ministry of Cultural Fund, as part of the Azad Ki Amrit Mahotsav Scheme. - We encourage all faculty and students to actively utilize and promote digital literacy by exploring the resources available in the library, like the N-LIST awareness program (https://agc.ac.in/PD F/1Sept_2021_NLIST_Webinar_24011 9_120030.pdf),the **NDLIprogram** (https://agc.ac.in/PDF/29August 2020 NDLI%20Webinar 240119 120628.pdf). We encourage our users to utilize NDLI for its outstanding learning resources and facilities.
- The entire library is under 360 degree CCTV surveillance and is enabled with LAN, Internet connectivity and Wi-Fi system.
- The College is equipped with a **Library Sub-committee** which acts as an advisory body and helps in decision making regarding overall development and quality enhancement of library services. The library staffs are always available at the circulation desk and they carry on their duties with utmost dedication and diligence to provide maximum services to the students and Staff of the College.
- The Library has a footfall of around **70 students** per day.

Administration (Main) Building, Old Building, Mancha Building, in order to provide free Network Access Facilities to all students & Faculty Members throughout the Main Campus.

- Keeping in mind the increasing demand, the existing **Internet Bandwidth has been upgraded to 100MBPS.** Asansol Girls' college has adequate ICT facility that is frequently updated.
- The campus is under 360 degree **CCTV Surveillance** with **25 CCTV** cameras installed at primary corners and is monitored though a Big Screen at Principal's office.
- The **institutional website** is maintained and updated regularly by a dedicated committee so that the stakeholders can access information and circulars seamlessly.
- LAN and network connections are duly monitored by technical assistants.
- College maintaines an e-attendance system through **Biometric** for keeping record of Staff attendance and their arrival and departure timings.
- The College Auditorium named 'Rabindra Kakhya' is ICT upgraded with modern sound system and projector.
- Recently the Morning and Day Libraries have been automated using **ILMS Koha software** with RUSA grants .
- The college also has a well-equipped **Computer Centre** with **45 computers** which are accessed by the students for lab-based classes as well as by faculty members for teaching-learning and Research work.
- The college has six Smart Rooms and one ICT centre fully air conditioned with 24 computers having internet facility.
- There are few more **ICT enabled classrooms** belonging to Science Departments.
- Salary of the college staff is administered online through the West Bengal Integrated Fund Management System portal. West Bengal Health Care Schemes are made available to the staff of the college. The college Finance is taken care by the College Administration Management System portal.
- Online admission has been introduced since 2015 and is conducted efficiently and Online submission of marks is done on the university portal.
- **Online feedback** is collected from stakeholders and is revised from time to-time and action taken at the earliest.
- Maintenance of UPS, Generators, Computer, Hardware and equipment are done periodically.
- The College considers maintaining a healthy Computer-students ratio, good working condition of present equipments and availability of better IT solutions while deciding upon the updating and enhancing of IT infrastructure.

- **The Vice Principal** plays a central role in coordinating various entities such as committees, departments, administrative units, Teachers' Council, Governing Body and IQAC to ensure a cohesive and effective delegation of decision-making and implementation processes.
- The IQAC serves as a quality control monitoring body overseeing different functions.
- **The Teachers' Council** executes important roles in matters pertaining to various fields related to students, faculty and general college improvement through decentralization of power by forming various committees. The Secretary of the Teachers' Council acts as a liaison between the Principal and teaching staff, facilitating smooth communication.
- Non-teaching staff have a council of their own that function independently. Their recommendations are discussed in IQAC and thereafter, if needed, in the GB where they have their representatives. The head clerk manages the distribution of administrative duties among the non-teaching staff.
- **Students'** involvement and participation is highly encouraged in various events like Annual Sports, Saraswati Puja, Annual Cultural Program, etc, under the supervision of teachers.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1

The institutional perspective plan is effectively deployed and functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules, and procedures, etc

Response:

The institutional perspective plan is effectively deployed through the functioning of:-

a) Administrative Setup

The collaborative efforts of the Vice Principal, teaching and non-teaching staff, and students, along with the support and cooperation of all stakeholders, drive the administration of Asansol Girls' College towards a common objective. The administrative structure and functional unit of the college is well represented in the form of an **ORGANOGRAM**.

The **Governing Body** as the policy making authority meets at regular intervals and resolves various policies by giving directions to the college and act accordingly. The decisions taken by the Governing Body in the meetings are executed by the principal through decentralisation of duties.

- The Vice Principal, as the head of the institution, oversees both academic and administrative activities, adhering to the directions and decisions of the Governing Body.
- All academic matters are supervised by the **IQAC** coordinator, who plays a vital role in maintaining and monitoring the quality of various academic and administrative activities of the institution.
- All financial matters are managed by the **Bursar**. It is then reviewed by the **Finance Committee** and is finally placed before the Governing Body for approval.
- The **Teachers' Council Secretary** along with the Assistant Teachers' Council Secretary is annually appointed by election or selection process by the college teachers. The TCS manages the **academic calendar** and coordinates the required functions accordingly. He/ She acts as a liaison between the principal and teachers.
- **The College Library** plays a vital role of academic learning among the students and teachers where the Librarians manage intellectual resources with the support of the library staff.
- Non-teaching Office Staff headed by a Group B clerk act as an extension of the Principal's Office and manage student affairs. The academic assistants help in laboratory management and ancillary work. The Group B, C and D staff work under the leadership of the Head Clerk.

The College maintains values of inclusiveness and well-being through special cells headed by senior members of the college namely **Grievance Redressal Cell**, **Anti Ragging Cell and Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) as per the UGC Guidelines.**

b) Appointment and Service Rules Procedures

The college authority (GB) issues appointment letter to the teachers on recommendation from the **West Bengal College Service Commission (WBCSC)**. The incumbents join the relevant posts by furnishing joining letters on the basis of the said appointment letters. The Governing Body approves their appointments and confirms their services after completion of at least one year of satisfactory service.

The West Bengal Government has restructured the service condition and benefits for Government Approved Part Time Teachers (PTTs), Government Approved Contractual Whole Time Teachers (CWTTs) and Guest Teachers as State -Aided College Teacher (SACT).

The Governing Body approves the appointment of the Bursar of the college

The recruitment policy of the Non-teaching staff is done through the formation of a Standing

Committee , by the Governing Body of the college

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

Performance Appraisal System:

- The performance of the **teaching staff** is assessed based on the orders of the Directorate of Higher Education Department of West Bengal as well as the regulations laid down by the University Grants Commission. Under **Career Advancement Scheme (CAS)**, laid down by the UGC, self- appraisal and the **Academic Performance Indicator (API)** scores proposed by the faculties for teaching related activities, domain knowledge, participation in examination and evaluation and contribution to innovative teaching, new courses etc. are verified by the IQAC and the Principal and the same is placed before the Governing Body, with the intent of seeking their recommendation for further submission to the Directorate of Higher Education.
- The CAS for the **librarians** is also followed following the same technique of evaluation.
- The **Non-teaching staffs** against substantive posts enjoy career advancement through scale enhancements at the end of ten years and twenty years of service as per the existing rules and regulations.
- The **laboratory assistants** are appraised at the end of seven years of service as per the existing rules.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

Following strategies were adopted for mobilization of funds

- Funds are generated through the **fees collected** from the students.
- It welcomes **donations, memorial prizes and endowments** from staff members, alumnae and guardians for the prize and endowment funds.
- Grants in aid for salaries of the staff are received from the Government of West Bengal.
- Fund has been allotted by the Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal for the **construction of lift** with installation and allied electrical works.
- **RUSA 2.0** grants have been allotted to the college for the overall development, construction and renovation of the college.
- Funds from the college fund are allotted to take up small scale research projects in the college under the supervision of the Research Consultancy Committee.
- During the last few years, Asansol Girls' College had forwarded its application to various organisations requesting them to provide grants for the infrastructural development of the college.

Strategies for optimal utilization of resources

- Expenditure for **maintaining and augmenting** academic and physical infrastructure has been done from college funds.
- Salaries of the staff are disbursed through the **HRMS portal**.
- Funds collected from students under different heads, like Sports, Cultural programs, Saraswati Puja etc, are optimally utilized according to the requirements.
- Financial help is provided to the needy students for the payment of their tuition fees from the Student Aid Fund.
- Funds of **RUSA 2.0** are being utilized in renovating college buildings and also for the purchase of books and equipments.
- An amount of Rs.2811000/- is allotted and utilized for the construction of lift with installation and allied electrical works.
- **Financial aid** is provided from the college fund to pursue small scale **research projects** by various departments under the supervision of the Research Consultancy Committee

Internal and external audits are regularly conducted to make optimum use of financial resources as per the directives laid down by the Finance Department and the Department of Higher Education of the Government of West Bengal. According to the norms of the Finance department of the Government of West Bengal, annual accounts are prepared every fiscal year at the end of 31st March. To maintain transparency in the financial matters, the payments are made after the approval of the Bursar, the Finance Committee and the Vice Principal.

For internal audit, an auditor is appointed by the college authority, who conducts the said audit very meticulously, providing advisories for improvement, if necessary.

The external audits are carried out by the audit firms assigned by the Department of Higher Education.

The audit report, received is placed before the Governing Body for approval and the relevant rectifications are made, if necessary, following the procedural recommendations suggested by the Auditor.

IQAC plays a central role for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes.

- The effort of IQAC has resulted in establishing **Research Consultancy Committee** for encouraging research activities.
- Add-on courses, seminars, workshops and international conferences are conducted to create better opportunities for multidisciplinary learning.
- IQAC encourages faculty and students for quality **publications** in Scopus, UGC and Peer Reviewed journals.
- IQAC conducts **Career counselling** through its Career counselling Cell.
- AGC collaborates with other educational institutions to provide faculty and student exchange.
- Faculties are encouraged to apply for research grants and grants for conducting seminars from the Indian Council of Social Science Research (ICSSR), Indian Council for Historical Research (ICHR) and the University Grants Commission (UGC).
- IQAC encourages teaching and non-teaching staff to participate in **FDPs and MDPs**.
- IQAC organizes workshops on Cyber Crime, Disaster Management, Child Care, HRMS, NAAC procedures.
- To ensure enrichment and dissemination of knowledge, **online library resources** are created and training is provided to the stakeholders.
- Innovative Pedagogical Approach include hands-on-training in laboratories, field excursions, industry visit, internships and other experiential and immersive learning.
- IQAC takes **feedback** from students periodically and robust student feedback mechanism has been developed for this purpose.
- IQAC conducts **Academic and Administrative Audit** with the active guidance of the affiliating university, KNU.

- IQAC has conducted holistic environmental audits including **Green Audit**, **Energy Audit and Environment Audit** to enhance environmental consciousness and responsibility.
- AGC offers certificate courses on Art & Craft and Tailoring & Embroidery to enhance their possible sources of income after graduation.
- Courses like **Soft Skills and Basic Computer Knowledge** have been introduced.
- AGC adheres to a consultative process for improving its teaching-learning processes that are reviewed periodically considering the feedback from the stakeholders. In the first cycle of NAAC, AGC was awarded a **Grade B+ (75.70) in the year 2007** and since then, AGC has improved continuously, which has been reflected in the NAAC report of the Second Cycle, wherein the college was awarded with **Grade A (3.03) in the year 2016**.
- IQAC requests the departmental coordinators to **conduct periodic meetings** to oversee and analyze the teaching-learning processes. The meetings emphasize on the various spectrum ranging from the completion of syllabi, continuous evaluation processes to the analysis of the semester results.
- Feedback from various Stakeholders is an important component of incremental improvement in teaching learning. The Feedback and recommendations are collected from all the stakeholders students, staff, and alumni to facilitate teaching-learning reforms.
- The construction of the **new Academic Block** with 8 classrooms has been completed in the year 2023 for providing classrooms to cater to the needs of various disciplines.

Response:

- Gender sensitization is an integral part of the course curriculum. A.G.C. offers papers like 'Contemporary India (Dept. of English): Women and Empowerment'(Dept. of English), 'Literature and Gender'(Dept. of English), Gender and Politics in India'(Dept. of Political Science), 'Gender and Violence' (Dept. of Sociology) etc., as per the university curriculum.
- In November 2018, the Sociology Department conducted a certificate course on 'Sociology of Motherhood'.
- The Women's Forum established in 2014-15 has worked relentlessly in addressing gender equity and empowerment by conducting regular interactive/orientation programs and workshops with students of all departments, for example, Workshop on Sexual Harassment on 21.11.19 & 21.9.22; organizing poster and drawing competition on gender sensitization; organizing panel discussions like on 'Bharater Swadhinata Sangram: Smaraniya Nari in 2022; 'Women in Science' etc., organizing Nukkad Natak on women's empowerment on 8th March 2023, and PPT presentation on women achievers in sports; conducting awareness program in the campus against child marriage in the post Covid-19 period along with NGO 'Prajaak'; undertaking regular counseling of those who suffer from emotional and mental problems; organizing collaborative health awareness and health checkup camp with Lions Asansol East; undertaking annual checking and assessment of overall security and safety measures in the college and hostel campus, etc.
- In 2022-23 the Women's Forum of A.G.C. has conducted **Gender Audit**.
- The Department of History organized **webinars and special lectures on gender issues** like, "A Special Lecture on Changing Norms for Women: From the Pre-Historical to the Early Historical Societies' in 2019; 'Steering the Course of Post-Colonial Life in Bengal: Women in Politics and Play' in 2020.
- The Department of Nutrition organized various seminars and webinars to spread awareness about nutrition. For example, 'One Day Webinar on 'Nutrition and Diet Perspective: COVID-19 Pandemic Scenario' in 2020, and ' International Seminar on Importance of Early Nutritional Intervention on Maternal Health Outcome in 2022.
- A.G.C. has **two NSS units** and **one NCC unit under the 10 Bengal Battalion.** In 2019 NCC unit of A.G.C. performed Nukkad Natak on 'Women Empowerment.'
- A.G.C. provides **financial aid to economically backward students** and helps them to break the economic limitation to access education.
- A.G.C. has appointed both **male and female security guards** at the college entrance and installed **CCTV** cameras at strategic points providing **24x7 security** to stakeholders.
- The Internal Complaints Committee, of A.G.C. is the statutory body that works towards the

prevention and prompt redressal of sexual harassment complaints. It creates legal awareness, promotes gender sensitization, and ensures the safety of the girls and staff in the college.

- A.G.C. has **Games & Sports facilities** encouraging students to participate actively for their physical and mental well-being.
- AGC has **installed sanitary napkin vending machines** in the washrooms for girls and female staff.
- In 2022, A.G.C. started ' **Yoga for Well- being Club**' and has appointed well-trained Yoga instructor to provide free-of-cost Yoga lessons to interested students.

- AGC admits students from different linguistic backgrounds. The teaching-learning is conducted in **bilingual mode** – Bengali and English. AGC offers undergraduate language courses like **B.A.** (Honours) in Bengali, Hindi, Sanskrit, and English as per the KNU curriculum. It celebrates linguistic diversity by observing International Mother Language Day; World Sanskrit Day; and Hindi Diwas.
- AGC offers various government and non-government scholarships to eligible students. Besides, **Complete or partial fee concessions/waivers** are given to students based on the annual family income.
- For differently-abled students, AGC provides various facilities like lift, ramps, scribes, etc. to make the teaching-learning inclusive.
- The Women's Forum of AGC organizes regular **counseling and orientation programs** to provide an inclusive environment.
- AGC organizes Annual Cultural Program where students from local tribes like Santhal participate and showcase their culture.
- AGC creates an enabling environment for students **through its mentor-mentee system** providing academic guidance, career counseling, etc.

- AGC ensures and practices the philosophy and ideals enshrined in our constitution. Days like Indian Constitution Day, Independence Day, Republic Day, and Youth Day are regularly celebrated.

7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1

Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual

Response:

- Title of the Practice: EARN WHILE LEARN (EWL)
- **Objective:** AGC believes in the capacity building of its students. With this aim, the college has taken many initiatives and practices. **Earn While Learn** is one of them. This practice aims to empower the students economically while continuing their studies.
- The Context: NEP 2020 promotes a holistic and skill-oriented curriculum that goes beyond traditional rote learning. This curriculum reform benefits girls by equipping them with practical skills that are relevant in various fields. It encourages critical thinking, problem-solving, and creative abilities, empowering girls to excel academically and professionally. In other words, NEP focuses on capacity building and empowerment. A.G.C. provides scope for capacity building and empowerment in the form of providing vocational training to the students and enabling them to earn and learn simultaneously.
- The Practice: EWL has been initiated as a best practice in the form of two Certificate Courses viz., a) Certificate Course on Tailoring and Embroidery, and b) Certificate Course on Art and Craft. The Certificate Course on Tailoring and Embroidery is conducted by Rinku Biswakarma, Chandrakala Sharma, and Puja Sharma under the supervision of the Course Coordinator Prof. Gouri Ghosh. The Certificate Course on Art and Craft has been organized in collaboration with Fevicryl. The course was conducted by Ms. Aparna Mukherjee under the watchful eyes of its Course Coordinator Prof. Gouri Ghosh. Students enrolled in these courses are expected to acquire the various skills and techniques of tailoring and embroidery, art and craft. Upon successful completion of these courses, AGC provides scope to showcase their skills and sell their products by arranging various exhibitions.
- Evidence of success: EWL is a successfully running practice. It has received an overwhelming response from the students. The college now intends to set up a space devoted entirely to these hand-crafted products made by its students so that potential buyers can easily locate them. AGC in a bid to promote the artworks of the students arranged an exhibition cum sale of these on 1st June 2022, where the students not only displayed their works but also managed to sell some of their creations. For instance, students like Sudeshna Bauri, Payel Paul, and Tanushree Nayak sold their products for about Rs. 890, 1940, and 840 respectively. For the last two years AGC students have been exhibiting their handiworks at the Government sponsored Paschim Barddhaman Book Fair with much success. In the 2023 Paschim Barddhaman Book Fair five students of AGC sold products of about Rs 3,785.
- **Problems Encountered and Resources Required:** At present with the increase in demand from the students, the infrastructure like the number of sewing machines etc., needs to be augmented. Hence, both the courses need more funding.

• Best Practice 2

- Title of the Practice: ACADEMIC INNOVATION AND RESEARCH
- **Objective:** Research activity is an integral part of the higher education institutes. It is essential for developing the spirit of inquiry and critical thinking among academics. To develop all these qualities among its students AGC has introduced Academic Innovation and Research Activity as its best practice.
- **The Context:** AGC constantly encourages the faculties and students to strive for excellence in Academics, Innovation, and Research. AGC believes that research environment and skill are equally needed for undergraduate students to inculcate the spirit of innovation, inquiry, and critical thinking among them. In this context, AGC felt the need to present a healthy environment

for academic innovation and research activities.

- The Practice: AGC has a Research Consultancy Committee. On 12th December 2019, the Committee was formed and started functioning immediately. Based on the proposals submitted by the different departments, funds of about one lakh rupees are allocated by the college to the departments, who get one whole year to complete their proposed research projects. The most striking feature of this practice is the active involvement of students in these projects. The students under the guidance of their teachers participate in these research projects by handling primary sources, preparing questionnaires, conducting field surveys, collecting data, arranging interviews, collecting specimens, etc. This practice not only develops the critical thinking ability of the students but also helps to develop a kind of cooperative relationship between the teachers as project investigators and the students as research assistants. The teachers also develop their skills regarding supervision of the research project and students develop a sense of creativity and innovative qualities in them.
- Evidence of Success: A sum of one lakhs of rupees was released for research activities in the first cycle of the grant. The Department of History completed and submitted its Minor Research Project on 'Shiva Gajan, Del or Gambhira the Spring Rite of Rural Bengal'. Some students of the department were selected as research assistants, who successfully conducted their field survey in two villages of Purulia district and interviewed both the participants of Gajan rituals and the onlookers. In the second cycle of the research grant, five departments- History, Economics, Hindi, Nutrition, and English are on the verge of submitting their projects. In the third cycle of grants, the Mathematics, Zoology, History, Commerce, and Chemistry departments have submitted their research proposals and grants have been sanctioned to them. Till now the Committee has achieved success as responses from the majority of departments are spontaneous. The tempo of research activities resumed with the return to normal situation. One positive impact of this practice is that many of our faculties are also on the editorial boards of internationally acclaimed journals. Some collaborative research projects in the near future are expected.
- **Problems Encountered and Resources Required:** Nevertheless, for some disciplines, especially, science subjects research funds must be increased to produce quality research. The research facilities like library facilities and laboratory equipment for science-based subjects like Physics, Chemistry, and Microbiology need to be modernized and augmented. Awareness about the importance of research activities must be spread among the students for more participation of the students.

Response:

AGC formerly known as Manimala Girls' College, began its journey as the **only girls' college in the entire coalfield and industrial region of West Bengal in 1950**. Since then, the college has been popular for upholding the concept of gender equity, green campus, inclusive and holistic education. The college stands out in the area in terms of:

Premier Seat of Learning and Research

Over the last seventy-four years, the college has been a premier seat of learning for the girls of the region. At present twenty departments are offering **B.A.**, **B.Sc.**, and **B. Com** courses affiliated with KNU, Asansol. The college also offers **M.A**. in Political Science which makes **Asansol Girls' College the only college under KNU offering M.A. in Political Science besides the University Campus.**

AGC is known for producing students with **outstanding academic results** both at undergraduate and postgraduate levels including university rank holders. Many pass-out students are pursuing higher education from abroad. Every year a considerable number of AGC students also qualify for **NET**, **GATE**, **SET**, **JAM**, etc.

The College has a very dynamic **Research Consultancy Committee**. Since its formation on 12th December 2019, the Committee has funded research projects submitted by various departments. Most importantly, the active participation of **students as researchers is mandatory for these research projects**. The involvement of students in research work is one of the most conspicuous features of the Committee making AGC distinct in the area.

Safe, Disciplined, and Green Campus

AGC, being a girls' college, has dedicated itself to ensuring a safe and secure campus for its students. AGC is well known for its **ragging-free** and well-disciplined campus. The college is also popular for its eco-friendly campus.

Gender Equity and Inclusive Environment

AGC has dedicated itself to promoting gender equity and inclusive education. The college has a very active **Women's Forum** which has been incessantly working towards promoting gender equity.

AGC has **two girls' hostels** providing scope for the girls from the remote areas of the region to continue their education.

The college also provides **financial aid to economically backward students** and helps them to break the economic limitations to access education. Women's Forum also provides financial assistance under **BHARSA (Basic Human Approach Regarding Student Assistance).**

Teaching-Learning Process Inside the classroom

AGC is reputed for regular classes. Keeping pace with the emerging challenges to the teaching-learning

process due to technological advancement and its impact on learners' approach towards the learning process, AGC keeps on adapting to the teaching-learning methods. For example, **regular class tests**, **remedial classes, Flip classroom style of teaching-learning, use of ICT, and students' seminars** are the regular and common features of AGC. All these are striking features of the college. Besides, AGC has adopted NEP 2020 in which students enjoy the freedom to select courses of their choice.

'Out of the Classroom' Learning Site

AGC encourages learning beyond the four walls of a classroom. The departments of the college regularly arrange for outdoor classes, field trips, and educational tours. Students readily take to gardening activities encouraged by the college authority. AGC is blessed to have students with multiple talents. Therefore, to nurture these myriad talents AGC encourages to join various clubs and societies within the college campus, such as **Praxia- the Drama Club**, **Chess Club**, **Cinema and Book Reading Club**, **Photography Club**, **Drawing Club**, and **Nature Club**.

Extension and Outreach Activities

AGC is well known for developing social accountability among students. NSS, NCC, Social Activity Committee, Women's Forum, and the Nutrition Department regularly undertake extension activities in the surrounding areas.

The NCC and NSS unit of AGC instil organizational skills to serve society and ventilate a sense of good citizenship among students through activities like plantation programs, cleaning drives, environment-related awareness programs, the spread of literary awareness under the New India Literary Program, etc.

Co-curricular activities

AGC stands out in its efforts to develop students' capabilities other than curricula-based education.

• Yoga

AGC has **Yoga for Well-being Club** to promote optimum physical and mental health, basic training on stress management and concentration, and to make students understand that yoga leads to a conscious living. The club has appointed **a well-trained Yoga instructor and provides free-of-cost Yoga lessons to interested students.**

• Sports

AGC has a **Sports Committee**. The Committee arranges **Annual Sports Meet** every year consisting of various sports like 100 m race; shot put; discus throw; high jump etc.

Cultural Activities

AGC is famous for exploring and nurturing talents in the cultural field. The annual cultural competition 'Roop, Rash, Taal, Chchanda' is held to discover hidden talents amongst students. The rank holders are selected to perform in the annual social 'Sristi Sukher Ullashe'. The best performers are regularly invited to perform in the government-sponsored local Fairs, Students' Youth Festivals, and cultural events organized in Rabidra Bhavan. For instance, the dance drama team of 'Chitrangada'

was invited to perform at the Govt. sponsored Paschim Barddhaman Book Fair in 2023.

Empowerment Program

A.G.C. provides scope for capacity building and empowerment in the form of two certificate courses in **Tailoring & Embroidery, and Art & Craft.** These two courses encourage students coming from economically marginalized sectors to find an alternative method of earning and simultaneously carry on with academic pursuits. To promote their artwork, AGC organizes exhibitions cum sales of their products. Over the last two years, AGC students have successfully exhibited their handiworks at the government-sponsored Paschim Barddhaman Book Fair.

Placement

Last, but not the least, AGC is different as it provides placement facilities despite being a general degree and PG college. Every year a good number of students get employed in banks and industrial establishments after graduating from AGC through placement drive organised by the **placement cell** of AGC.

In short, AGC is distinct for its dedication toward successful implementation of holistic education for girls which coincides with its motto (in Bengali) **'Amar Mukti Aloye Aloye'** or orienting students to the spirit of **emancipation through the light of knowledge.**
